Our students marked their respect for this great leader through their poems, essays and drawings.





## This month, make a trip to...

Pallikaranai Marsh is one of the last remaining natural wetlands of Chennai city. It is locally known by the generic Tamil

name *'kazhuveli'*, which means a marsh or waterlogged area. Pallikaranai is one of the 94 wetlands identified under the National Wetland Conservation and Management Programme (NWCMP) of the Government of India.

Pallikaranai Marshland acts as a natural wastewater purification system. It helps in reducing water pollution and acts as a biologically diverse ecosystem. It is a good habitat for fish, avian fauna and several other animal and plant species. It mitigates floods and the effect of cyclones and tidal waves. It helps in water retention and recharge, improving the groundwater level.

It is considered to be of international importance as it is representative of rare, endangered and threatened species, of both flora and fauna. It acts as a forage and breeding ground for thousands of migratory waterbirds from various countries every year.

The Pallikaranai Marshland was opened to the public on October 2nd. The place has walking areas and is equipped with chairs and benches for people to enjoy the birds. One can enjoy the greenery, as well as sit under the shades of trees and get fresh air. Bird watchers have mentioned that they have spotted the famous Eurasian cuckoo — a winter migrant from the Himalayan region!
